heater for Development (TfD) creates a safe space for community members to engage in deep conversations, reflection and urgency to generate collective action toward issues concerning them. With support from Eastern Produce Malawi (EPM) Limited, we are engaging communities surrounding its 18 Tea and Macadamia Estates in Mulanje and Thyolo using TfD in the three-year long Tiyambe Project. During the performance at Nasonia Estate, community members pressed their Village Headman and sought clarification from James Mpando, a member of the Thyolo Police Victim Support Unit (VSU) on how they handle cases of GBV that are reported to them

ender based violence including intimate partner violence is still one of the challenges affecting the people in Malawi, particularly women and girls. The communities surrounding the tea and macademia estates are not spared from this challenge. While interventions to address gender-based violence are being undertaken, lack of proper infrastructures for the victims to utilise as they seek help in the Police Stations is still a problem. In response to this need, Eastern Produce Malawi (EPM) has constructed two Victim Support Units (VSUs) in Thyolo and Mulanje districts through its Women Empowerment Initiative.....

Breaking social barriers to Human rights and freedoms of LGBTIQ people

alawi is among the countries where key populations such as the LGBTIQ community are facing various forms of discrimination across different sectors of the society due to their sexual orientation. With support from Southern Africa Litigation Center (SALC), we are implementing the Umunthu Inclusive Society project and we have been engaging Primary Justice Actors (PJAs) to understand the social climate of LGBTI people, and its interplay with global health, mental and social wellbeing.

"I wish I was exposed to this information when I was still at the law school, I have misjudged members of the LGBTIQ community. And, frankly speaking, before this workshop I couldn't provide justice to such people," expressed First Grade Magistrate from Mkanda in Mchinji district.

To ensure that the process is all inclusive, individuals from the police service, judiciary, LGBTI activist, lawyers and independent human rights activists took part in curriculum development prior to these Umunthu dialogues. The PJA workshops have been conducted in the targeted districts of Mchinji, Dedza, Phalombe and Chikwawa. Participants included Police Victim Support Unit Officers, community policing officers, investigations officers, lay magistrates, community and religious leaders.

This initiative is being complemented by convergence workshops with the LGBTIQ+ community members and their family and friends in Mchinji and Dedza to build a network that will be effective in responding...

Umunthu in practice

"I practice Umunthu to the point that I have angered a lot of people. I have rejected huge sums of money that individuals offer to steal drugs at my office. And these people report me to high authorities claiming that the boy is rude. The Umunthu workshops I have attended has helped me to realize my potential and deny people who attempt to steal medicine meant for the poor people. The realization of my potential has also assisted me to form a Community-Based Organisation (CBO) called 'Tigwirizane' after observing the huge existing gap between health workers and community members who perceived us as drug stealers. This is when I realised that it was us, the health care workers who need to change our mind-set to restore the lost trust."

Muronya expressed this during the Umunthu Circle Dialogue under the theme, 'Umunthu - The practical way of life'.

hildren as right holders are in a better position to know what they need as well as demand for the same. Special Children's Rights radio program takes the Campaign to the Public

Upon observing the knowledge gap in terms of peoples understanding of Children's Rights in Malawi, one of the participants in the Unicef Child Rights and Reporting Training, Noel Mkwaila, developed, recorded and produced a Special Child Rights radio program which was aired on Ndirande FM. Mkwaila conceptualized about a program that can bring to light people who are aware about these rights to put across their knowledge to the general public. We participated in the recording of the program in GVH Masaka, TA Machinjiri. Apart from interviewing our key stakeholders in the area who included GVH Masaka, Village Headwoman Chipande, a Child Protection Officer, the VDC Chair, TA Machinjiri's Clerk, and a Health Care worker, children sung songs and one of them recited a poem. The Program also solicited views from one of the county's Child Rights Activists, Lucky Mbewe and our YCE Lead, Lekodi Magombo.

heatre for Development (TfD) is a powerful tool for engaging communities in dialogue and promoting social change. With support from the Scottish Government through the Trocaire fund, we have engaged communities under TA Mwambo in Zomba to understand their lived experiences on non-economic loss and damage (NELD) due to climate change. The TfD performance was also an important step in raising awareness about the community's role in addressing issues of NELD. By engaging the local community in dialogue and learning about their lived experiences, we have also strengthened our understanding of the complex impacts of climate change as well as inspire action to address the same.....

We believe the community is better placed to capture and tell stories of their lived experience on Loss and Damage. In this regard, we have nourished the capacities of 10 young people from GVH Chaweza in Zomba and 9 young people from GVH Mambundungu, Mtemangawa and Mbangu in Nsanje with Photojournalism skills to capture the lived experiences with regards to NELD. The photographs and stories collected during the applifying community voices research project will support advocacy efforts aimed at improving the lives of those impacted by climate change induced NELD.

ommunities have the power to inclusively and collectively make meaningful decisions on matters affecting them only when there are platforms where everyone is free to participate. The Umunthu Circles dialogue is one such space where every participant shares their perspectives on matters affecting them. Community leaders, authorities and survivors from GVHs Ngabu and Mbenje of Nsanje took turns in expressing their understanding of issues of NELD according to their lived experiences through art and in-depth conversations. It was disclosed that only a few men are brave enough to report and approach camp authorities when they are faced with this issue because they are private matters. Most of them satisfy their needs outside marriage which has led to the spread of STIs including HIV, Child neglect and deteriorating mental wellbeing among survivors......
